

Programs and Services

Robert E. Lehton Children's Shelter

Offers 24/7 emergency residential care and supportive services for youth who have run away, are homeless, waiting for foster homes or in respite, or are otherwise in crisis, and their families.

Transitional Living Program (TLP)

Is a comprehensive program offering housing and supportive services to help homeless young people ages 16-21 achieve self-sufficiency.

Street Outreach

Targets homeless, runaway, and young adults through a mobile street outreach team.

Community Counseling

Provides counseling and case management for children and youth ages 6 - 17 and their families to find solutions to issues such as school performance, truancy, runaway behaviors, and family conflicts.

Independent Living Services

Assists youth aging out of foster care in making a successful transition to independent adulthood.

Safe Place

Helps children get immediate help from Crosswinds by entering any one of over 100 Brevard businesses or public buildings displaying a Safe Place sign.

Juvenile Assessment Center

Is the central point of entry for coordinated service delivery for delinquent and at risk youth and the central point of contact for law enforcement.

Civil Citation

Is an alternative to arrest for youth with certain misdemeanor offenses, which holds them accountable, while offering counseling and other services for youth and their families.







Shelby Villatoro

Some people look at difficult situations and use them as excuses while others use these experiences as motivators to push them forward in meeting their goals. Shelby Villatoro, a 2012 recipient of the Crosswinds Opportunity Fund, opted for the latter. At the age of 15, her mother moved out of state and left her bouncing between

friends' houses in search of stability. She worked a part-time job at a local grocery store and committed herself to finishing high school. As a senior Shelby was elected class president and began earning credits in a local community college. Her dedication to her studies paid off as she was awarded both an Associate of Arts degree as well as a high school diploma in 2012. Immediately thereafter she was awarded the Opportunity Fund from Crosswinds Youth Services and used those funds to assist in paying upcoming tuition.

In December 2014, Shelby graduated from University of West Florida with a Bachelor of Arts in Communications and landed a job as a Communications Coordinator at a local public relations firm. She is currently pursuing a Master's degree in Strategic Communication and Leadership. Shelby praises the support of Crosswinds in assisting her

to attain successes that years ago seemed so far from reach.

Bethany Fischer

On the morning Bethany accompanied her mother in delivering gifts to Crosswinds Youth Services she realized that some poor choices she had made in the past had come full circle. Years earlier she had made a poor decision that landed her in a Civil Citation program for first time youthful offenders that provides a second chance.

At the time her mother was raising both her and her brother as a single parent while getting out of an abusive marriage. Prior to that her mother had been diagnosed with breast cancer and the family struggled during those difficult circumstances. It was then that Bethany met a counselor at Crosswinds who emphasized to her "that good choices would become the foundation for the life she wanted."

Years later, Bethany graduated high school, attained her Associate degree and is now working toward her Bachelor of Arts in Education with the goal of becoming a history teacher. She is proud to have worked for over 4 years at McDonald's, and now she assists her mother in her business that supports other charities that meet existing needs in her community. Returning to Crosswinds, years later, reinforced her desire to help others as she reflected on the assistance she was provided and emphasized her need to "pay it forward" - a lesson she had been taught as a child.






